



## EAST FALMOUTH BRANCH LIBRARY BUILDING PROGRAM

#### HISTORY OF COMMUNITY

Concise history of the community, including a brief discussion of demographics, industry/economic drivers, and overall composition/identity:

#### THE TOWN OF FALMOUTH

The Town of Falmouth was incorporated in 1686 under its original name, Suckanesset, and its name changed to Falmouth in 1694.

Between 1660 and 1704, white settlers purchased property from the Wampanoag tribe ("People of the First Light"). From 1686 to 2024 generations of Falmouth families including the Wampanoag and immigrants from the British Isles, Europe, Iberia, Africa, and many far flung islands have cleared the land, tended sheep, hunted whales and fished the sea, harvested cranberries and strawberries, explored oceans, built churches, schools, libraries, and houses, laboratories, and businesses. For almost 340 years, the people of Falmouth have lived together, creating a Town with a rich diversity of ethnic groups and varied traditions.

Falmouth is the second-largest town on Cape Cod with 68 miles of shoreline. An economically diverse community, its largest employers are the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, Falmouth Hospital, the Steamship Authority, the Town of Falmouth, and the Marine Biological Laboratory. In addition to the scientific, medical, educational, services, and business fields, the Town's economy is also hospitality-based. The year-round population of Falmouth hovers at 32,500, and increases in the summer to almost 100,000.

The Town operates under a Home Rule Charter with a five-member, elected Select Board, a Town Manager, Assistant Town Manager, and Representative Town Meeting with nine precincts. Falmouth is comprised of eight villages, each with its own character and traditions: Woods Hole, Falmouth Village, West Falmouth, North Falmouth, East Falmouth, Teaticket, Hatchville, and Waquoit. In addition to the Main Library in the center of town, two branches of the public library are located in East Falmouth and North Falmouth. Two of the other village centers, Woods Hole and West Falmouth, have small independent libraries.

#### EAST FALMOUTH VILLAGE


Situated between the Coonamessett and Childs Rivers, this thriving village, originally home to the fledgling but short-lived mill industry has been the agricultural heartland of Falmouth. It was settled by a large influx of immigrants from Portugal, the Azores, and Cape Verde Islands, who, by the 1920s, were the driving force behind making East Falmouth the largest producer of strawberries per acre in the nation. Although much of the farmland has been converted into residential and commercial properties, East Falmouth is still agriculturally focused. Today, the village of East Falmouth has a noticeably lower median household income (\$67,964 in 2022 dollars) than the whole of Falmouth (\$89,809 in 2022 dollars).






























# Why do we need a new library?

The existing structure isn't purpose-built as a library. It lacks quality, useable square footage across all program areas. It has numerous accessibility deficiencies. It has failing building systems that are past their service life. It has indoor air quality issues. It uses fossil fuels.



# What is the Vision for the New Library?

The residents of East Falmouth have long awaited a new state-of-the art branch that will replace the existing library. Through a 2022 user survey, as well as ongoing conversations with patrons, we've found there's a clear desire and need for a community meeting room, additional space for adult programs, more comfortable seating and a greater use of outdoor space.



# Why did we apply for the State Grant?

In January 2025, Falmouth was awarded funding by the Massachusetts Public Library Construction Program (MPLCP). This competitive state grant will pay for a portion of eligible project costs to construct a new branch library in East Falmouth. The Town can reasonably expect to receive roughly half of the cost of the new library from the State.




## What is the MPLCP?

The Massachusetts Public Library Construction Program (MPLCP) is a grant program managed by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC). It was first funded by a state bond authorization in 1987. Since then, the MPLCP has helped build 62 new library buildings and 169 addition, renovation, and conversion projects. Grants are awarded based on the needs of the community, the current state of the library being added to or replaced, and the local economy.



# How large will the new library be?

The new library will be roughly 9,000 square feet in total. This compares to the current, 7,200 square foot library. More meaningful is the increase in the net useable square footage, which almost triples from 2,500 SF to 6,500 SF.



# Will the new library be handicap accessible?

Yes.


The new library will be fully handicap accessible, with no level changes like those found in the existing library.



# Will the new library include meeting space?

Yes.


The new library will accommodate two private study rooms and a flexible 50-person multipurpose room, with a dedicated kitchen and storage room.



# Will the new library be a sustainable facility?

Yes.


The new library will aspire to be net-zero or net-zero ready. It will meet Falmouth's Green Community regulations and current energy code requirements. It will be a fossil fuel free facility, incorporating energyefficient, all-electric building systems. Increased building ventilation and air filtration will make this a healthier building. We will explore opportunities to incorporate on-site renewable energy, such as solar. The use of natural materials and views of the pond that will connect the library and its patrons to the library's natural surroundings (biophillia).




## What is the construction timeline?

It will take between 18 and 20 months to construct a new library on the existing site. The start of construction depends on when State funding becomes available and on a Town vote accepting State funding. MPLCP grant funding most likely would come on line in 2028, with construction in 2029 and the grand opening of the new library in 2030.






